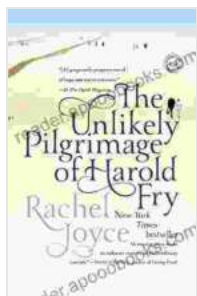


The Unlikely Pilgrimage of Harold Fry: A Tale of Courage, Resilience, and the Power of Human Connection

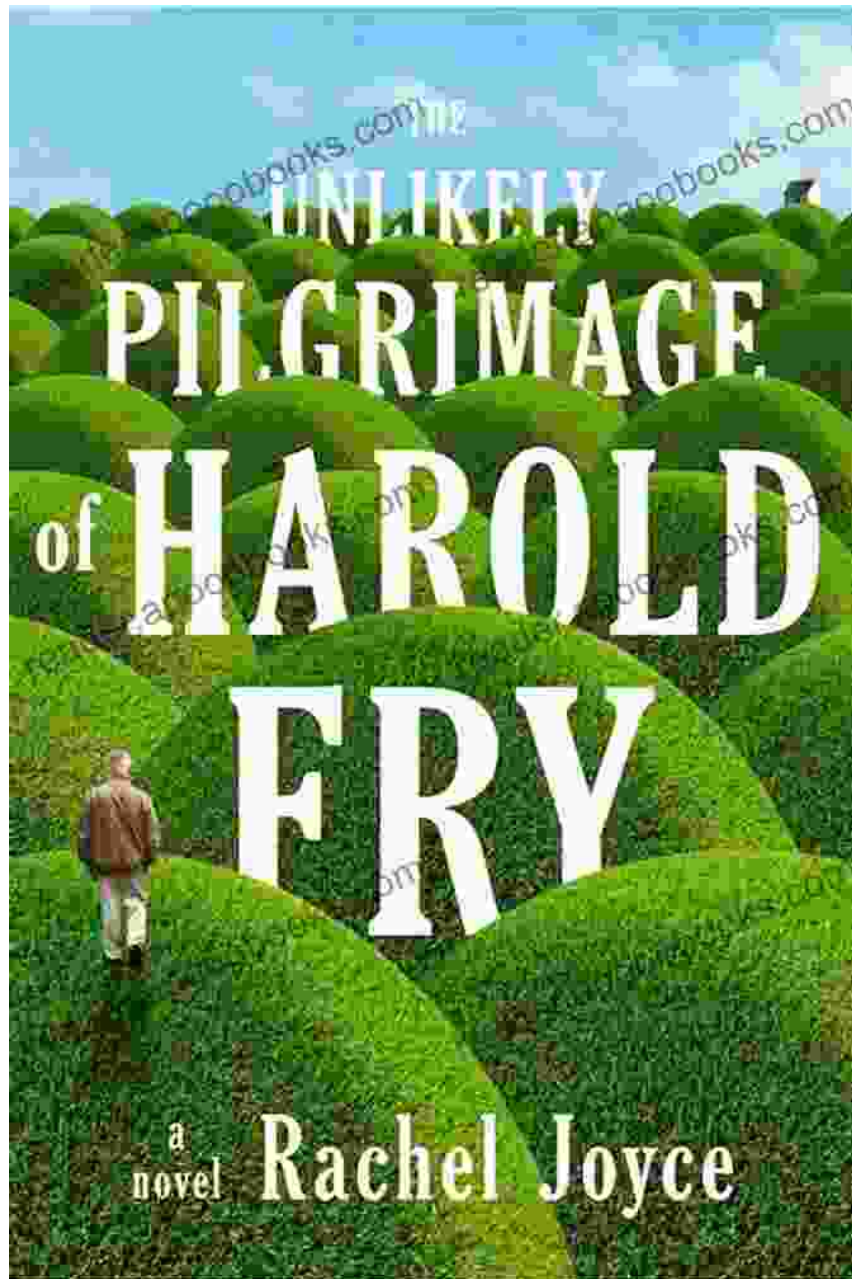

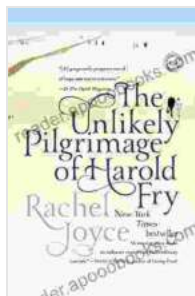

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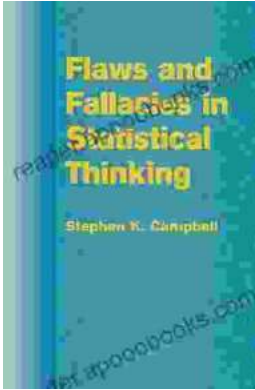
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
